#### **SPECIFIC SCHOOL RULES**

- 1. Students must not leave the school yard during regular school hours.
- 2. Students, who walk to school, are requested not to arrive until 8:45 A.M.
- 3. Everyone must remove their shoes at the door and take them to their classrooms.
- 4. Students may not play in the bush or outside the playground fencing. Climbing trees, breaking branches off trees in front of the school or climbing on the school roof are not permitted.
- 5. Students may only use the school phones (one in every classroom), to call home for emergencies, such as illness, or if they missed the bus and need a ride home.
- 6. Students must play outside during recess when weather permits unless requested to stay inside by parents.
- 7. The bus is an extension of the school so students still have to follow the behaviour guidelines and specific rules of the school.
- 8. Everyone is encouraged to be co-operative and courteous at all times. When there are problems, students and teachers meet together to try to solve them. School rules are in place to make the school a warm, safe and happy environment.
- 9. Students enrolling in Nursery must be 4 years of age before December 31st.
- 10. School trips are a privilege and not a right. Students who attend less than 85% or have been suspended (out of school) twice may lose the privilege of attending school trips. **Achievement, Attitude and Attendance** are also factors that are considered. Class trips for Elementary School students are limited to the Province of Saskatchewan.
- 11. Students may not use skateboards or heelies on school grounds during school hours.
- 12. Throwing snowballs is not permitted.
- 13. Students may not bring cell phones, MP3's, I-Pods or other electronics to school.

#### **CODE OF BEHAVIOUR**

Keethanow Elementary School exists to help young people acquire the skills, knowledge and values that will enable them to live full and productive lives. While you are here, Keethanow Elementary School is your school. However, you share this school with many other students and all students that attend the school have the right to learn in the very best educational environment that can be provided.

The best learning environment exists when all students observe important behavioural guidelines. These guidelines are: to exercise care, courtesy and common sense.

**Care:** In your use of the school building, ground, supplies,

and equipment provided by your parents and the Lac

La Ronge Indian Band.

**Courtesy:** Toward every person, student, or staff member in school.

**Common Sense:** In your approach to the school rules and expectations of yourself.

#### RESTITUTION

The staff at Keethanow Elementary School has been trained to use Restitution in dealing with unwelcome behaviours from our students. The Restitution program recognizes that all people have basic needs. These behaviours are a result of one or more of these needs not being met. The emphasis is on finding positive ways to meet needs rather than on punishment. Restitution aims to;

"Create conditions for the person to fix their mistake and return to the group strengthened." – Diane Gossen

#### BULLYING

At Keethanow Elementary School we strive to keep our school safe for all students. We take bullying very seriously and believe that it has no place in our building or on school grounds.

#### What is bullying?

A student is being bullied or victimized when he or she is exposed, repeatedly and over time, to negative actions on the part of one or more other students (Olweus, 1993, pg.9).

Bullying takes many forms, and can include many different behaviours, such as:

- Physical violence and attacks
- Verbal taunts, name-calling and put-downs
- Threats and intimidation
- Extortion or stealing of money or possessions
- Exclusion from the peer group

(ASAP: A School-based Anti-Violence Program, 1996)

We encourage parents and students to report incidents of bullying to the office so that they can be dealt with in a timely manner.

#### **SCHOOL DISCIPLINE POLICY**

#### MINOR OFFENCES:

- 1. Inappropriate talking during class.
- 2. Refuse to do or complete work assignments/homework.
- 3. Not following class rules.
- 4. Students arriving late for school.
- 5. Wandering the hallways without a pass.
- 6. Loitering in the washroom.
- 7. Misuse of school supplies.
- 8. Students play fighting.
- 9. Throwing objects.
- 10. Disrupting other classrooms.
- 11. Shoving, pushing, wrestling.

#### **MINOR OFFENCES CONSEQUENCES:**

- 1. Individual meeting with student.
- 2. Student contract.
- 3. Denial of privileges:
  - a) recess
  - b) temporary removal from class for one-on-one extra attention
  - c) after school extracurricular activities
  - d) in class privileges (i.e.: field trips)

#### **MINOR OFFENCES - ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES**

All minor offences in the classroom, hallway or school grounds will be dealt with by a teacher or supervisor.

When teacher tolerances have warranted them to have the administration deal with the minor offences, the teacher will take the student to the office or call the office to pick up the student. Documentation is required.

- 1. Conduct report must be filled out describing the incident.
- 2. Administration will deal with the incident.
- 3. A copy of the report is given to the teacher.
- 4. Report is kept in Administration office which is followed through.

#### **SERIOUS OFFENCES**

- 1. Talking back.
- 2. Teasing or bullying in the school or playground.
- 3. Students discriminating against each other.
- 4. Lying.
- 5. Possession of dangerous objects (weapons) such as; slingshots, BB guns, knives, etc.
- Violation of bus rules.
- 7. Swearing with intent and/or obscene gestures.
- 8. Absenteeism skipping school.
- 9. Spitting at others.
- 10. Threats
- 11. Self-threatening behaviour.
- 12. Theft
- 13. Fighting
- 14. Defiance

#### **SERIOUS OFFENCES CONSEQUENCES**

1<sup>st</sup> incident: - 30 minutes in-school suspension

2<sup>nd</sup> incident: - 60 minutes in-school suspension with counselling or after school detention.

Parent or guardian is informed by phone.

3<sup>rd</sup> incident: - Suspended for 1 day and a documented letter delivered to the parent or

guardian with copies on file for School Committee. Parent or guardian must

be with child to return to school after a suspension.

#### **IN-SCHOOL SUSPENSION**

The main purpose of I.S.S. is to teach students to accept the consequences for their actions, give them time to evaluate their behaviour, and become actively involved in finding positive alternatives to their irresponsible actions. The purpose of I.S.S. is not to punish, rather to discipline. In "Teacher and Child", it states:

"To punish a child is to arouse resentment and make him uneducable. The essence of discipline is finding effective alternatives which leaves the child's dignity intact, teach him how he has violated another's rights, and motivate him/her to do better."

I.S.S can be such an alternative.

#### **SERIOUS OFFENCES ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES**

All serious offences will be reported to administration, depending on the serious nature of incident, will follow the consequence ladder. Documentation is required by way of a conduct report.

#### **EXTREME OFFENCES:**

- 1. Abusive language and behaviour towards teachers and students.
- 2. Damaging or destroying school property, this includes vehicles in the parking lot.
- 3. Fighting (Serious).
- 4. Smoking and snuff chewing.
- 5. Inappropriate "touching".
- 6. Use of dangerous objects (weapons) such as; slingshots, BB guns, knives, etc...
- 7. Drug, solvent and alcohol use.

#### **EXTREME OFFENCES CONSEQUENCES:**

Students will be automatically suspended from school.

#### **EXTREME OFFENCES - ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES**

- 1. All extreme offences will be reported to the Principal.
  - Documentation is required.
- 2. Principal notifies the parent/guardian.
- 3. Administration takes the student home with documented letter. Parent must be with child to return to school after a suspension.

#### WAYS PARENTS CAN HELP

- 1. Please, especially with younger children, <u>put names on clothing</u>. It is not uncommon to see a dozen pair of identical looking shoes or boots.
- 2. Children should be dressed for cold weather.
- 3. For children who ride the bus, we ask that parents help to ensure that these privileges are not abused. It is never pleasant to have to discontinue a privilege because of misconduct.
- 4. Outdoor footwear must be removed at the entrance, to keep hallways clean and dust free. If possible, students should have indoor runners for gym activities.
- 5. Students are encouraged to make full use of library books. Parents should encourage children to read to them and also help students take good care of all school books.
- 6. School doors open at 8:30 A.M. Although, we try not to let any students wait outside in cold weather, we ask for parents' co-operation by not sending children to school before 8:30 especially during winter.
- 7. Parents are asked to phone the school **(306-635-4402)** when students are absent because of illness or any other reason.

#### SCHOOL WEATHER POLICY

When the temperature reaches  $-40^{\circ}$  C or lower, or the combined temperature/wind chill factor reaches  $-40^{\circ}$  C or lower.

The school will be remain open but the school buses will not be running.

\* This is based on 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m. *Environment Canada* weather forecasts \*

The school will also be closed in such events as:

• when the pipes are frozen or the furnaces fail

In the case of a power outage, the students are dismissed if the outage lasts longer than 30 minutes.
